


NEW HAMPSHIRE + TOBACCO



OTHER TOBACCO PRODUCT USE

- The prevalence of smokeless tobacco use among adults in New Hampshire was 2.7% in 2013. 5.3% of adult current cigarette smokers in New Hampshire were also current smokeless tobacco users in 2013.³
- In 2013, 7.3% of high school students in New Hampshire used chewing tobacco, snuff, or dip on at least one day in the past 30 days. Nationally, 8.8% of high school students used smokeless tobacco on at least one day in the past 30 days.²
- In 2013, 13.0% of high school students in New Hampshire smoked cigars, cigarillos, or little cigars on at least one day in the past 30 days. Nationally, 12.6% of high school students smoked cigars, cigarillos, or little cigars on at least one day in the past 30 days.²

ECONOMICS OF TOBACCO USE AND TOBACCO CONTROL

- In FY2015, New Hampshire allocated \$125,000 in state funds to tobacco prevention, which is 0.8% of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Annual Spending Target.⁴
- The health care costs in New Hampshire, directly caused by smoking, amount to \$729 million annually.⁴
- State and federal Medicaid costs for New Hampshire total \$139.2 million annually for smoking-

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caused health care.⁵

- New Hampshire loses \$506.9 million in productivity each year due to smoking.
- New Hampshire received an estimated \$258 million in tobacco settlement payments and taxes in FY2015.⁴

STATE TOBACCO LAWS^{6,7}

EXCISE TAX

• The state tax increased to \$1.78 per pack of cigarettes in August 2013. Little cigars are taxed at a rate of \$1.78 per twenty cigars. Loose tobacco, smokeless tobacco, snuff, and large cigars (except premium cigars) are taxed 65.03% of the wholesale price.

CLEAN INDOOR AIR ORDINANCES

- Smoking is prohibited in childcare facilities, public schools, restaurants, and bars (allowed in cigar bars and allows for an economic hardship waiver).
- Smoking restrictions are required in all government workplaces, health care facilities, private workplaces, casinos, retail stores, and recreational facilities.

YOUTH ACCESS LAWS

- The minimum age requirement for the purchase of tobacco products is 18, and penalties exist for both minors and merchants who violate this law.
- Establishments are required to post signs stating that sales to minors are prohibited.
- The sale to minors of electronic cigarettes is prohibited.

CESSATION STATISTICS AND BENEFITS

- The CDC estimates that 52.3% of adult smokers in New Hampshire tried to quit smoking in 2013.
- New Hampshire's Medicaid program covers all seven recommended cessation medications and individual counseling. Group counseling is covered for pregnant women only.
- The state Medicaid program's barriers to coverage include minimal co-payments.
- New Hampshire's state quitline invests \$2.56 per smoker; the national average investment per smoker is \$3.65.⁷
- New Hampshire does not have a private insurance mandate provision for cessation.
